## "Racialization of international students from Asia in Canada"

## Dr. Ann H. Kim

This talk highlights the present phase of internationalization as the federalization of education migration period to reflect the importance of federal strategies and the coordination of multiple sectors and levels of government for facilitating the recent growth, and now contraction, in the numbers of postsecondary students from Asia in Canada. It assesses the ways in which the success of internationalization has been conceptualized and measured in terms of enrolment, countries of origin, and revenue (tuition fees), and argues for conceptualizing success in terms of inclusion, equity, and Indigenization, and tackling anti-Asian racism. Drawing on a collection of studies from a recent coedited and open source book, International Students from Asia in Canadian Universities, we will discuss the current climate and challenges, and policy shifts.

Dr. Ann H. Kim is Associate Professor of Sociology at York University, Faculty Associate at the York Centre for Asian Research, and current Director of the Korean Office for Research and Education. She studies migration and race and ethnicity, and has a long-standing interest in the Korean diaspora. She is co-editor of three books, Korean Immigrants in Canada: Perspectives on Migration, Integration, and the Family (UTP 2012), Outward and Upward Mobilities: International Students, Their Families and Structuring Institutions (UTP 2019), and International Students from Asia in Canadian Universities: Institutional Challenges at the Intersection of Internationalization, Racialization, and Inclusion (Routledge 2024).
